School student Luke Agius' latest short film Fragments, has just been named one of the best student pieces in the Department o Education's annual Connected Learning Awards.

Fragments is not what you'd expect from a 14-year-old schoolboy. It's a dark and macabre look into the life of a teenage ice addict. Buoyed by a string of distorted images the film looks at the inner turbulence and violence of a young addict. Taking his directorial lead from idols Stanley Kubrick and Alfred Hitchock, Agius says his film's generally tread a far darker course than most people expect from someone his age. But the results are speli-binding, hardhitting and and undeniably topical, proving he's got his finaer on the social nuise.

"There's a pressure and an expectation that eople my age will experiment with drugs," gius says. "The film's not meant to scare kids ff drugs, I think if they want to experiment rith them then they will. It's meant to make eople stop and think."
